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

Keys to Effective Bible Study





KEY 1: Relationship

Give Priority to Your DEVOTIONAL LIFE!

- Invite the Holy Spirit to be your teacher.
- Approach the Word of God with **prayer.**
- Read and meditate on the Bible to hear from God.
- <u>L.I.F.E.</u> Bible Reading Method. Download this guide at the website below -<u>www.localchurchdynamics.org/outreachpamphlets</u>

KEY 2: Approach

Always read the Bible in **CONTEXT!**

- Who is the <u>AUTHOR</u>?
- When was it WRITTEN?
- What is the <u>CULTURAL SETTING</u> of the verses you are reading?
- What is the <u>CONTEXTUAL SETTING</u>? (What is happening before and after the text? It is always good to read at least one chapter before and after the text.)

KEY 3: Observation

As you read the Biblical Text, ASK QUESTIONS Prayerfully!

- What is the **BACKGROUND** of the text that you discovered in **Key 2/Approach?**
- What did the author mean to <u>EXPRESS</u> to their <u>original audience?</u>
- What did the original audience <u>UNDERSTAND</u> from their cultural setting?
- What <u>KEYWORDS</u> stand out in the text? (Write them down, look them up in the dictionary, our use a Hebrew or Greek lexicon for deeper insights.)
- What is the **MAINPOINT** that naturally reveals itself as you ask these questions?

[NOTE: With tough verses remember this important principle - "LET SCRIPTURE... INTERPRET SCRIPTURE!" If the verse is unclear, are there other Bible verses that can clarify the meaning of the word or verse?]

KEY 4: Formation

Create an <u>OUTLINE</u> of the text following its natural subpoints.

- This outline will follow the <u>natural flow</u> of the text as you ask questions and write down your observations.
- As you develop your outline, write down any <u>subpoints</u> that will help to develop and illustrate the main point of the text. (Keep your subpoints to a minimum. Usually 3-5 at the most).

- Write down and state the <u>main point</u> in your own words in a way that will be easy to understand by your target audience (children, youth, adults).
- As you prepare your final teaching outline you can state your main point at the *beginning* of the teaching, illustrate it *throughout* the outline, and summarize your closing with a *practical and personal application* of the main point.

"The <u>main</u> thing, is to keep the <u>main</u> thing, the <u>main</u> thing!" (Author unknown)

KEY 5: Application

this lesson in my relationship with God and others.

- The <u>interpretation</u> of the text is what we naturally observe by allowing the Scriptures to speak for themselves through these <u>inductive steps</u>.
- The <u>application</u> should agree with the interpretation but it will be restated in practical and cultural terms that enable one to put the <u>main point</u> of the teaching into practice in their life.
- Additional applications can be gleaned from the text that do not flow directly from the interpretation of the text. However, these need to always be in harmony with the key interpretation.
