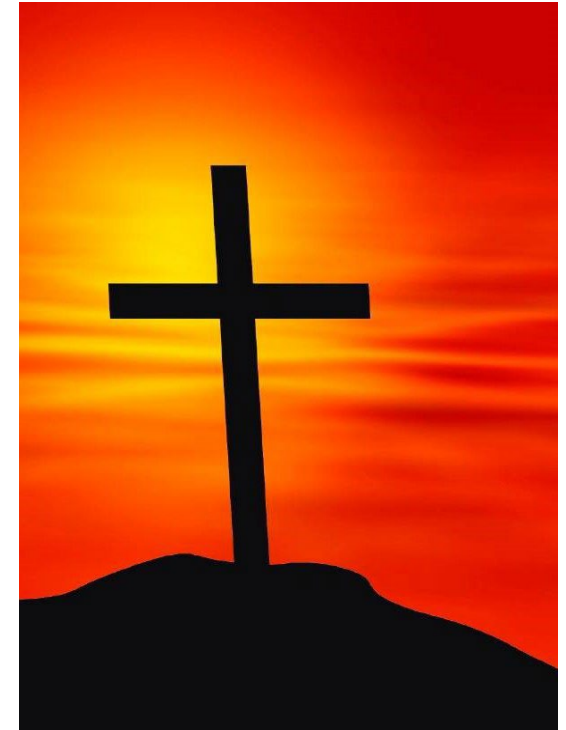

How To Become A Christian



How does a person become a Christian?

This is a question many people are asking today, and it is a question that seems to have many different answers. However, I am so glad that there is a definitive guide to help us answer this question, and that is the **Bible**.

Following Peter's great sermon on the Day of Pentecost, in **Acts 2:37**, the Bible tells us that the people who heard this sermon were,

"...moved in their hearts and asked, Men and brethren, what shall we do (to be saved, become a Christian)?"

Peter replied in **Acts 2:38**,

"...Repent and let everyone of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit."

This echoed the words of Jesus found in the Gospel of **Mark 1:15**;

"The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God is at hand: repent, and believe the gospel."

From these Scriptures, we can see that there are two important steps in becoming a Christian. **1) to Repent**, and **2) to Believe** (followed by baptism as an outward expression of one's personal decision - see Acts 8:12).

The result of becoming a Christian is, **3) you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit**, and **4) you will receive eternal life** (John 6:47).

Now...let's try breaking this down using a practical example that I think we all can identify with.

Red lights and sirens...

How many of you have been pulled over by a police officer for a traffic violation? Ok, now that I have your attention, let's see how this experience can help us understand the steps to becoming a Christian.

You were doing 75 in a...

Regardless of whether we are speeding 5 miles over the limit or 50 miles over the limit, it makes no difference; we still find ourselves pulled over on the side of the road. When the police officer comes to the side of our car, we have a choice. We can deny that we broke the law, try to make up as many excuses as we can think of, **or we can recognize our fault and admit it, both to ourselves and to the officer.**

In the same way, as we are convicted in our hearts of our sin and our need for God, we can try to make up excuses or recognize and admit our sin and need for forgiveness. Once we do that, we have completed the first step of **repentance**. What happens next?

Your drivers license please...

The police officer says, *"Driver's license and registration."* In essence, the officer is asking us to **surrender our identity. Repentance is not complete unless** we are willing to surrender our identity, our hearts, wills, and emotions to God.

Repentance says, *"I am a sinner and can no longer be lord of my own life (run my own life)."* **Believing** says, *"I need to surrender to God and ask Jesus to be the Lord of my life."*

Baptism is the physical act that expresses the spiritual commitment of our heart (see I Peter 3:21). **Without repentance and surrender...we will be headed to jail (understand the parallel?).**

The long walk back...

So, sitting nervously, we watch the officer walk to his car with our identity and begin to punch things into their computer. We think, *"Perhaps he will find that unpaid parking ticket?"* Or, *"What type of fine will I get?"*

However, we need to **exercise faith** that our laws will help us receive a fair judgment. When we **repent, surrender, and believe** in Jesus Christ as our Lord, we are placing our faith in the promises of the Bible and the fact that God promises to be a Just and Righteous Judge. In **I John 1:9**, the Bible clearly assures us that,

"If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Imagine the officer returning to your car to inform you that **your driving record is completely clean, and a notation has been made on your record to forgive all your future traffic violations — if you are truly sorry!** Wow, that would be great, but it will never happen in the real world. **YET, that is exactly what happens when we repent and believe in Jesus Christ as our personal Savior and Lord!**

The Holy Spirit comes into our lives and gives us a **new heart, a new identity, new gifts and abilities**, and a **new freedom** to hit the road of life knowing that we are in the constant care of the Creator of the Universe. Paul writes in **I Corinthians 5:17**,

"Behold if any man be in (believe in) Christ, he is a new creation, old things are past, BEHOLD ALL THINGS ARE BECOME NEW!"
